Raith

On the afternoon of January 15th, 2013, fire swept through the house known as Raith, a disused home, damaging a considerable part of the upper floor. Over the next two years the house was ignored and weather damage added to the destruction.

Raith, bought by the Child Welfare Dept in 1964 and previously a hostel for children aged between 12 and 16, along with its 2.25 hectares of land, was finally sold to a developer at the end of last year. The condition of sale was that the house gets restored to its preinstitution glory. A lucky group of CAHS volunteers were privileged last Friday, to view the results of the restoration. The house is now quite grand, with attention to original detail even going as far as replacement of the pressed metal ceilings in some areas.

Originally built in 1903 by H J Merewhether for his new bride, Wilhelmina (Nina) Gore, it is of Indian bungalow style with a dominant roof line and wide verandas.
